What will you remember and miss most about the school?

"The people; I am a people person. The students and staff make the school tick. I love working with students; in fact, I'm off to help some of our musicians tune their guitars after this conversation - the Year 12s

should know better by now!

When I arrived at the school, I was so warmly welcomed by so many. To be honest, as a body of staff, this is the best I have ever worked with. I have loved the fact that people feel they can talk to me."

What has your greatest achievement and proudest moment been?

"My greatest achievement has to be the comments I received following an Ofsted inspection. I was recognised by HMI for my leadership style and the way I expertly forged teams.

I was incredibly proud after the parent's survey results came through because all the percentages of the results had increased, and in particular the question asking whether parents would recommend The Chalfonts Community College to others. This increased from 68% to 85% during my headship."

Do you have a final message for your staff and students?

Mr Denial has always had an aspiration to cover the 14 years of education from Reception to Year 13 and this role at Preston Manor will give him the chance to do this. He wasn't looking to leave the school at this time but he was approached about the job and, as his message states above, grasped the opportunity.

We wish him lots of luck and happiness in his new role and look forward to hearing from him, once he has settled in.

Hints and tips for successful apprenticeship applications

Unilever Our Head Girl, Beth Bowers, has recently been offered a 'Level 4 Associate Project Management Apprenticeship' with 'Unilever'. We thought it would be interesting to hear about her experience in identifying an apprenticeship and successfully navigating her way through all the tests, interviews and assessment centres. Over to Beth...

I always knew that University might not be the route for me as I wanted more 'hands on' experience in the workplace instead. I discovered apprenticeships through careers events I attended within school and it was at the start of Year 13 that I started searching for one.

I originally looked at a Police apprenticeship for 'Thames Valley' but then decided to go down the business path instead, as it seemed more suited to me. With the help of our schools' amazing Careers Advisors (located in the LRC), I searched on many websites and also used our online careers platform, 'Unifrog'. These websites helped me narrow my search and locate different levels of apprenticeships.

The 'Unilever' apprenticeship programmes are usually advertised in January/February. After the initial application

process, you are likely to complete competency tests such as maths tests or situational judgement ones, to narrow candidates down further. If you successfully complete these, you will hopefully go on to do an interview or assessment centre. I was invited to attend a remote assessment centre for 'Unilever', which consisted of a creative task I had to do individually and then group tasks where they assess your team skills.

Anyone that is thinking of doing an apprenticeship I would absolutely say go for it. The experience from applying and completing the process is amazing even if you don't end up doing one! Here are my tips;

- 1. Try to find out the date the companies are opening applications - the earlier you apply, the better chance you have of being considered by the organisation.
- 2. Create a strong, relevant CV to impress them with your skills and experiences.
- 3. Think carefully about what the company may be looking for in your application (e.g. a management role would require you to have good leadership skills.)
- 4. Be confident and be yourself that will take you far.

Year 8 - Marine Engineering Workshop

Just after the Easter holidays, Suzy Green, the STEM Co-ordinator of the Sea Cadets came in to school to deliver a 'Sea Cadets Marine Engineering Pathway' workshop for a class of our Year 8 students. The Sea Cadets are a vibrant national charity, passionate about inspiring young people to engage with STEM subjects and highlight the career opportunities in Marine Engineering.





The hands-on sessions covered Maths and Physics principles, including buoyancy, density, The Crown of

Syracuse and Archimedes. In teams, the students were provided with materials, to build a boat. They were given card and silver foil to make the boat water tight. Each of the teams tested their boats on water and there was a competition to see how many marbles it was possible to place in the boats before they sank.

This was one of our first visitors into school post lockdown and we are hoping to invite Suzy back in again to run workshops later in the year.



'All School Read...' – The Goldfish Boy

As a school the Chalfonts Community College has been reading *The Goldfish Boy* by Lisa Thompson. Staff members read the book and it was introduced to students after the Easter break.

The Goldfish Boy is a story about finding friendship when you're lonely - and hope when all you feel is fear. Twelve-year-old Matthew is trapped in his bedroom by crippling OCD, spending most of his time staring out of his window as the inhabitants of Chestnut Close go about their business. Until the day he is the last person to see his next door neighbour's toddler, Teddy, before he goes missing. Matthew must turn detective and unravel the mystery of Teddy's disappearance - with the help of a brilliant cast of supporting characters.

In May, Years 7-10 watched a talk delivered by the author, Lisa Thompson. It gave our students the opportunity to have their questions answered by the author herself. Lisa Thompson thanked the CCC community for embracing her book and discussed her favourite reads and inspiration with us. It was a great watch, enjoyed by all!

The Goldfish Boy was published in the UK and North America in 2017 and went on to become a bestseller. It has been nominated for numerous awards including the Carnegie Medal, The Branford Boase Award and the Waterstones

Children's Book Prize.

Virtual Work Experience 2021



Five of our students from Years 10 – 12 engaged with a virtual work experience programme with *Align* from 6th – 9th April 2021.

Align is currently working in partnership with major international and privately-owned infrastructure companies on the HS2 development. In July 2017 the **Align** joint venture was awarded the UK High Speed two line (HS2). This will include a 3.37km viaduct, 16.04km twin bored tunnel and five vent shafts handling both intervention and tunnel ventilation facilities.

The virtual work experience programme included meeting professionals from the following areas of the organisation:

Students attended workshops on **Effective Teamwork**, **Writing a CV** and **How to Present Effectively**. Students were set a project task and informed about the variety of apprenticeship opportunities.

100% would recommend carrying out virtual work experience with Align to other students.

Maths Challenge

In February and April, students from Years 10 and below took on the UKMT Intermediate (IMC) and Junior (JMC) Maths Challenge which is a very, very tough national competition.

Almost half a million high achieving pupils from more than 4000 schools and colleges across the UK participated where student have to answer 25 questions in 60 minutes. Only the top 40% of scorers nationally are awarded certificates.

Pupils at our school achieved: **5 Gold, 13 Silver and 38 Bronze** certificates in this year's challenges.

Special mention goes to: Ben, Nicole and Lily in Year 10 and Dexter, Zara and Yuvraaj in Year 9 for qualifying for the follow up rounds called the Grey and Pink Kangaroo.




Alumni - Where are they now?



In 2020, Emma McCullagh (11K3) beat competition from hundreds of other young students in Buckinghamshire to be selected as only one of two girls from the county to go to Loughborough University for a **Sports Leadership** Camp organised by Youth Sport Trust. Sadly, the event was cancelled due to Covid-19, but instead they organised a virtual event which took place over a weekend in June 2021.

The weekend involved 150 girls nationwide who were split into teams. They got to know each other via online 'break out' rooms, where they could share experiences and achievements. Olympic medallists carried out

workshops on resilience, empathy, creativity and aspiration. There were keynote speeches from inspirational athletes and coaches like Zahra Butt, the first qualified boxing coach to wear a hijab. Sports sessions included netball, cardio jamming, street dance and even disco yoga!

Emma said, "During these workshops and break out rooms, I was able to get to know my team and I gained more confidence. I learned about so many different types of people, their aspirations and achievements, as well as gaining knowledge on the role of empathy in people's lives and how it factors into the qualities needed for leadership."

Visiting Bucks New University



Sending 'Cecelia' on her way

Just before lockdown, the students of The Chalfonts Community College were invited to participate in a competition to name two tunnel boring machines which are being used to

excavate tunnels as part of the construction of HS2. The machines are named to bring luck to employees who will be working on the TBMs underground. Around 4,500 people from across the UK took part in the poll to select the final names and one of our current Year 8 students, Mia Miles suggested the name 'Cecelia', which was chosen for one of the machines. Mia submitted this name as she felt inspired by Cecelia Payno-Gasposchkin, who was a local Astronomer and Astrophysicis, born in Wendover; the first woman to attain full professorship at Harvard through sheer determination and resilience.

On Monday, 5th July, Mia and a small group of CCC students were invited to the HS2 site to watch 'Cecelia' commence her journey.

Alter Ego Production: 'Breaking the Chain'

On Friday 2nd July, Year 8 watched a production called 'Breaking the Chain', performed by the Alter Ego theatre group. We were extremely lucky to secure this performance for free because of the excellent relationships that we have built with the Thames Valley Police over the years, so we would like to extend our thanks to them and the performers for this opportunity.



The performance itself focused on a 27 year old, recently released from prison, having killed someone linked to knife crime. As he works hard to turn his life around; he has to intervene to 'break the chain' in preventing his siblings and their friends from following in his footsteps.

The aims of the play were to: Break the chain by reassuring young people that knife carrying is not common and they do not need to carry knives to protect themselves; Raise awareness around the risks and consequences of youth violence and knife crime on the individual and on their friends, families and on the wider community; Build resilience by, creating a common language and kick-starting conversations around the influences, fears and pressures that can lead to the decision to hurt

someone or to carry a knife; Promote the core skills that can be used help young people to navigate a whole host of issues, critical moments and adverse childhood experiences; Raise awareness around the importance of **seeking help and advice** or telling someone if they are concerned about themselves, a friend or someone they know; **Sign-post** who young people can speak to.

Year 12 History Visit to Hughenden Manor

As part of the A level History British Empire module Year 12 students visited Hughenden Manor just near High Wycombe on a glorious summer's day.

Hughenden was purchased by Benjamin Disraeli as his country home in 1848 and was cherished by himself and his wife Mary Anne. Securing the manor was vital to the realisation of his political ambitions and his personal aspirations and it provided the setting for a political drama and royal visits. The top floor is dedicated to Queen Victoria who Disraeli made Empress of India.



The Year 12 students explored the house and gardens to obtain a real feel for its history. The young Disraeli was an unlikely politician with his flamboyant appearance and heavy debts. He married a wealthy widow and bought Hughenden Manor which became his much loved home and private retreat. Its library contains a rich array of books and its dining room is adorned with a portrait of Queen Victoria who was once a guest for lunch.

Hughenden Manor was the base for a secret map-making organisation during the Second World War. The new exhibition gave a real insight into the secret history of the manor house

It is certainly worth a visit.

Year 10 student on an 'Inspire Programme'

During lockdown, one of our Year 10 students Aswini Rejeesh participated in an 'Inspire Programme' run by St John's College, Oxford University and won amazon vouchers for the assignments she completed.

She said about the experience:

I found the programme really interesting. It was a lot of work but gave me good experience of independent learning. It fascinates me just how much evolution has changed the world and the impact is has on people.

All students were off timetable for the day and were tasked with


