## 'We Value....' Community Club



Since the start of September, Year 7 students have been working once a week in tutor time to learn about themselves and their community. By learning more about these things, we hope that they will value what they have and work to contribute to making these things better. After learning about that weeks focus, there is a Tuesday lunchtime Community Club in the Hall, where they can come and put into practice what they've learnt.

For example, students have been watching interviews with non-teaching members of staff, then meeting that person at lunchtime to get to know them. They've also learnt about ways to manage their moods, then coming to lunchtime meditation sessions to practice this.

If students attend five sessions, then they earn the 'I care' award, which recognises their efforts. After 15 sessions, they can earn the 'I connect' award and after 30 sessions, the 'I champion' award. This term four students have earnt the 'I care' award. Congratulations to these students for their commitment and thank you from the Chalfonts Community College for working to make it a better place.

## Tell us a bit about your job:

"I work in Rupa's busy parliamentary office in the Houses of Parliament. I'm part of a small team -- there are four of us in Team Huq -- and we support Rupa in her parliamentary duties and assist her constituents with any issues they are facing. My role is varied and no two days are ever the same. On any given day, I am usually replying to correspondence from constituents, producing videos of Rupa's appearances in the Commons, managing her diary, social media and website, writing press releases, liaising with journalists, submitting parliamentary questions, and helping to organise the All-Party Parliamentary Groups (APPGs) that Rupa chairs «It's an exciting job and I feel so fortunate to work for Rupa, who works incredibly hard for her constituents."

## How did you end up in working in Parliament?:

If you had told me when I was studying for my A-Levels that I would end up working for a Member of Parliament, I wouldn't have believed you. Politics seemed utterly out of reach for me as a career option, and I still have to pinch myself walking around the Hogwarts-style set of buildings that make up the parliamentary estate.

After I graduated, I studied English Literature at the University of York, followed by a Master's degree in Politics & International Relations at Durham University. After that, I worked on an MP's re-election campaign during the 2019 General Election, before working and training as a journalist at the start of 2020. I ended up in my current job during the pandemic in July 2020. I worked from home for most of the year due to the Covid-19. It was about a year before I got the chance to see some of my colleagues in person! (Interview Continues Below...)



Which teachers at Chalfonts Community College inspired you the most?:

"English was by far my favourite subject at CCC. That was

in no small part due to the brilliant and inspiring teachers in the English department, in particular Miss Weir, Mrs

Castleton and Mrs Caccaviello. I have fond memories of studying To Kill A Mockingbird with Miss Weir, Romeo and Juliet with Mrs Castleton and The Great Gatsby with Mrs

Caccaviello. Despite my reputation for being a bit of a class clown, they kept me focused, inspired my love of reading and helped me develop communication skills that I used for my degrees and now my job! I can't thank the teachers at CCC

What top tips do you have for students who would like to work in politics?:

enough for getting me to where I am today."

"Read widely and keep up to date with what's going on in the news. Email your local MP (or perhaps an MP you admire if your local one doesn't share your politics) and request some work experience. If you're interested in party politics, join a political party and get involved in local meetings and canvassing sessions (knocking on doors and talking to voters on the doorstep). There are plenty of other pathways into politics if party politics isn't your thing: you could work for a think tank, a charity or some other form of NGO, the United Nations, or you could get into political journalism.

Most importantly, though, my advice would be to go for it and don't set yourself any limits. Politics doesn't have to



be dominated by Eton/ Oxbridge-educated people with loads of contacts. We all have a stake in what goes on in Parliament, we are all impacted by the decisions taken there. The place belongs to all of us."

## Flourishing Garden Project

We were delighted to be invited by the Iver Environment Centre, to participate in a project that encourages volunteering and social action in young people. Two groups of students were asked to the centre in Iver to learn about the environment and do some volunteering, weeding and planting. The idea was that the students would then return to school and introduce a 'social action plan' of their choice. Our students agreed that they would like to change part of the school field into a wildlife garden. We were very lucky to receive a budget of £500 and the students decided to buy plants, litter pickers and a lovely wooden bench with these funds.

Before undertaking the works on the field; the students were all given a guided tour. The pond, hibernacula, minibeast hotels, compost heaps and raised beds were pointed out, to show good examples and inspire ideas for the children's wildlife garden. The students then split into two groups to carry out essential tasks needed in the centre. Group one raked leaves, to ensure that our footpaths were fully accessible and not slippery. It was explained that collected leaves make great compost to rot down and use as a growth medium. The leaf pile compost heap was pointed out, and it was suggested that one was included in

their garden design. The students used rakes, wheelbarrows, brooms, and a leaf grabber, and cleared the sensory garden, paths at the front of the centre, paths along the greenhouses, and the path across the bridge.

Group two worked on moving both gravel and topsoil from our car park. The gravel and topsoil had been delivered for our footpaths and meadow respectively. The students used shovels and wheelbarrows to move the material out of the car park, so that we could once again have a big space for our visitors to park, improving accessibility to the site. ## Chalfont St Peter aims big for biodiversity in 2022

An outstanding new project is literally putting down roots in Chalfont St. Peter. The Big Biodiversity Battle (#BBB) is an ambitious partnership project between Chalfont St Peter Parish Council and Chiltern Rangers. Supported by Bucks Council Community Board and the parish council, 10 new Biodiversity Action Plan (BAP) Priority Habitats have been identified and work has already started.

So far 1,000 trees have been planted at two of the 10 sites with Chiltern Rangers volunteers and recruits planting 600 trees, and fifteen Year 7 and Year 8 students from The Chalfonts Community College planting the rest in the CSP Garden of Ease. Four girls planted a whopping 130 trees between them.

The project aims to have been completed by April 2022 so lots of help is needed from volunteers in the community and local landowners. Plans include installing benches, planting trees, planting wildflowers and to maintain and restore the River Misbourne. A key aim is to help our young

people to take ownership of their own environment and to change the planet one plant at a time. After a terrible two years this is a golden opportunity for children from zero to ninety to rediscover the joy of the outdoors, nature and the satisfaction of a job well done.

Upcoming events: Thursday 23rd December at 10am upgrading the banks of River Misbourne at the Community Centre/Council Offices on Gravel Hill. Volunteers most welcome.

3rd February 2022: The Chalfonts Community College Duke of Edinburgh students will be planting even more trees, building deer fences and installing bat and bird boxes including tawny owl and kestrel.


## CCC Virtual Christmas Concert 2021

## The Reading Scholars Programme

We were delighted to return once again to Reading University with a group of our Year 10 students to commence another Reading Scholars Programme. The Reading Scholars Programme at the University of Reading provides students with a valuable opportunity to find out more about their options beyond school and to increase their understanding of Higher Education through Information and Guidance sessions and conversations with current students (Mentors). The programme offers a head start in developing key study skills that will prepare them for further study and support their academic attainment, confidence, and aspirations.

Away from School

We will be visiting the university four times over the next seven months and will be participating in a variety of workshops and activities that will give our students an insight into what it is like to be at university. The students will cover a few topics through the programme. Firstly, they will find out about their options beyond school, college and sixth form looking at the benefits of higher education. They will then have conversations with current students (Mentors) who can talk about university from first-hand experience! Finally, they will develop key study skills and competencies that will help them in their current studies, as well as providing them with a head start in learning and practicing advanced skills that will facilitate their transition to higher level study.

By participating in the Year 10 Reading Scholars Programme, we hope participating students will develop confidence and knowledge about what a university has to offer, so that they can make informed decisions about whether university is the right path for them, and if it is, what they need to do to get to where they want to be.






## Merry Christmas!
