Dear Parents and Carers,

## COVID 19 Vaccinations for 12 to 15 year olds

All children aged between 12 and 15 years are being offered a first dose of vaccine as part of the schoolbased COVID-19 vaccination programme. The School Age Immunisation Service (SAIS) will be the primary provider and will be legally responsible for the delivery and parental consent of the vaccine. Vaccines will be administered by healthcare staff and not school staff. The local SAIS provider team will provide dates for the vaccinations shortly and I will update you as soon as I have further information.
