"I personally think work experience should be 2 weeks as it felt very short and I didn't get to experience everything I wanted."






WizeUp in Maths

Andy Giles from **WizeUp Financial Education**, a charity that aims to make financial and employability learning more accessible, gave a lesson to the Year 10s earlier this year in May. The students learnt about mortgages, rental properties, income tax and national insurance deductions from payslips and budgeting. Over **91%** of the 35 students reported that they learnt something new in the lesson and almost 2/3rds

of student understood the relevance of learning Maths in school. The students really enjoyed (94%) having an external person coming in to deliver the lesson and it helps that Andy was a former teacher! This lesson highlighted that Maths is really vital to important financial decisions and on top of the many possible career options in the future. We hope to provide further lessons from external employers / charities to continue to develop the students' learning.





I attended the NHS ODP practitioner work experience at High Wycombe Hospital for two days. Even though two days may seem a short period of time, I was able to gain insight into what working

within the NHS consists of from the importance of communication skills, being a team player, and maintaining confidentiality and professionalism. From shadowing Orthopaedic and Cardiac surgeons as well as Anaesthetists and other staff I was able to experience the layout of patient care from pre-op Clinic to recovery in a ward.

now raised £1,043 from non-uniform and




brings our total fundraising to date to


£3,516.66 which is a fantastic achievement. We will continue to raise funds for our LRC throughout the autumn term in order for us to

The Sora App is Back!


A few benefits for using the Sora App below;

But six years after her retirement, Carrie finds herself sitting in the stands of the


1994 US Open, watching her record be taken from her by a brutal, stunning, British player named Nicki Chan.




The Kind Worth Saving By Peter **Swanson** Genre: Thriller/ Crime


he can trust, the sociopathic Lily Kintner, the woman who once stabbed him, but with whom he shares a peculiar bond.


Art News

What is your current role and who do you work for now?



What tips would you give to students about their future careers?



The 2023 Duke of Edinburgh's Bronze Expedition

Mrs Byrne has again put herself in the firing line and taken another large group of our students out for a weekend away from home. The expedition took place on the 17th and 18th June with 110 eager students from Years 9 and 10 meeting up at Tring Station. Having already prepared their routes they set off in their groups heading for the Ashridge Estate (managed by the National Trust) where they spent a few hours wandering about searching for the staffed checkpoints along their routes before meeting



up for lunch next to Ashridge House (which coincidentally is where the early planning stages for the scheme too place back in 1956) After lunch the students made their way to their overnight campsite at Hudnall Park. Here they had to erect their tents and prepare their own evening meals. (Pasta came out as a firm favourite – although cooking methods did vary!) The students then entertained themselves with various ball games, running around together, talking with each other and there was even a few rounds of Ring a Ring o' Roses.!

Most students did make it into their tents before the 11pm curfew time and the majority of them did enjoy a few hours sleep, although a small group of boys did think it was reasonable to be up and playing football at 5.30am.

Day 2 began with the students making their own breakfasts and packing up their tents and rucksacks ready for more staggered departure times. This time heading for walks around the northern section of the estate before meeting up for lunch at the Bridgewater Monument. Once fully refreshed they made their final escape from the estate heading downhill and back to Tring Station where they were eagerly met by family and/or friends who seemed rather keen to take them home for a clean-up operation.!

Overall it was a fun weekend with a few life lessons learnt along the way, although the school minibus obviously hadn't read the script and decided it didn't want to leave the car park (alternator failure) and we needed the AA to get us going again...

Annual Fishing Trip Year 7, 8 and 9

For the second year running, a number of our SEN students were invited to participate in a

fishing trip organised by **Mr Spooner** (LSA) who is involved with the **Buckinghamshire Masonic Fishing Charity**.

Lakeside Farm in Leighton Buzzard provided the perfect setting, both scenic and tranquil. The 12 students were organised into pairs at various points around the lake with each pair being assigned to one of the six casters from the charity. The individual casters explained how to prepare for fishing with a demonstration of how to attach the float to the line, tie a hook and bait it with one or more live maggots. Despite some initial reservation, the students were enthusiastically picking up the bait, baiting their hooks and practising casting the float. All that was left was to sit back, relax and wait patiently in the hope of a bite.

Very early on, the first fish were caught and the excitement grew amongst the students. The fish varied in size and the species caught were Perch, Roach, Bream and Gudgeon. Unfortunately **Mr Spooner** was accompanying Trent and Rakin who landed a total of zero for hours on end. Their luck changed when they were reassigned to a different caster and began to add to the overall tally. **Mrs Mole** (LSA) put her faith in **Mr Spooner** to teach her how to fish... she courageously

picked out her maggots, skillfully hooking them in readiness for her cast...unsurprisingly she was unsuccessful at catching a fish. This caused much amusement to **Mr Maclean** (SENCO) who baited Mr Spooner mercilessly on his lack of fishing expertise! The only thing the support staff caught that day was a sun tan.

At lunch the students were treated to a barbeque and refreshments kindly provided for free by the charity. It was a much needed break in the shade. Fishing continued after lunch and catch after catch was reeled in with a final tally of over a hundred caught and safely returned to the lake.






Dance Success for Kiki
