



Install the Sora app from the Apple App Store or Google Play Store, or go to **soraapp.com**.

- In Sora, find your school (or enter your school's setup code), then sign in.
- Browse the Explore tab and borrow a book. Your book will open so you can start reading right away
- Close the book and go to your Shelf to see all your books (including assignments).

From there, you can:

- Tap Open Book or Open Audiobook to read or listen to the book.
- Tap Options to renew or return the book, get to your notes and highlights, and more

Leo LOVES Christmas.







When our attitude is right, we realize that we are all walking on acres and acres of diamonds.


Opportunity is always under our feet. We don't have to go anywhere. All we need to do is recognize it.

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
Art News

Chalfonts Success Stories

Name: Amber Smith

What is your current role and who do you work for now?

I am a Stunt woman.

I work in film and TV (self employed) My job takes me all over the country and world!

Tell us a bit about your job.

I have trained towards the British Stunt Register, having to become a master at 6 skills. I have done rock climbing, rally and precision driving, scuba diving, boxing and swimming.

I don't have uniform, if I'm doubling an actress, I wear her costume. If I'm driving a car I just get a top half and of I'm just being safety for people I wear active wear.

Sadly, film hours are usually 12 hour days, however, as a stunt Performer we usually work in 8 hour contracts (and if we stay after get paid overtime).



We get paid per day, a base rate of £500 then a 'buyout' of around 60% (a one off sum) or 'royalties' which is a percentage of the films gross profit (varies a little depending on job). Then we get paid travel, insurance etc. Before overtime it usually is around 1000 a day.

What did you study at The Chalfonts Community College and which years were you in Chalfont? I was at The Chalfonts Community College from the years 2005-2012. I studied English, Drama, performing arts and music.

What inspired you about doing this role? When did you decide to take this career?

I always wanted to either be in film and TV or stage! I didn't even consider a stunt Performer, I just thought that was for daredevils. I was working as a PA looking after actors, when I came across stunts. I started doing work called 'special action' where I got the opportunity to be a storm trooper for six months. All the gang were training to be stunt performers. I gave it a go, that was five years ago and I haven't looked back since.

What tips would you give to students about their future careers?

The best tip I could give, is give it your all and don't let anybody tell you 'you can't do it'. There's always going to be so many doubters, so you have to be your biggest fan. Keep pushing and achieving.

Anything is possible, don't give up. Life's an adventure, go live it. and your energy into working hard so that you can achieve that. Always try your best, that will look different day to day yet know that if you don't get the grades you want the world is full of second chances and opportunities for you

to grow and become the individual you want.

Employability Skills Day - 2024

We are looking forward to our **Employability Skills Day** on Tuesday 30th January for our Year 11 students. It is a key day in the calendar where our students come into school with the purpose of answering the question "what do I want to do when I leave school". It gives the students a clearer perspective of the different career paths that they may choose.

We have received tremendous feedback from those students who attended last year's event and we are using their feedback to further enhance the current Year 11 students' first experience of the workplace and help them to answer that all important question. The success of the event is achieved through everyone working together: from volunteers available to provide support on the day and also utilising our parents' networks to identify new companies and\or individuals who can give our students an understanding of a broad range of industries and work sectors.

We try to cover as many education pathways, industries and work sectors as possible to inspire our students with normally between 35-40 employers in the hall on the day; remember this represents the first opportunity for many of our students to speak directly with an employer so it is important to get a good mix of companies. The event also allows the students to undertake a fifteen minute job interview which will be followed up with feedback on how they performed and interview tips going forward. In addition to interview skills, there will be a number of workshops for the students to attend on the day. Some of them include: CV creation, the IT industry, NHS, Apprenticeship information and application process, University, STEM and Education pathways.




Sixth Form Pantomime

Today **Mrs Winterborne** took our Choir to perform at our local care home, **Windsor Lodge**, to entertain the residents, staff and families.


