















Cookie and Hot Chocolate Mornings


These amazing students were all invited to the termly Cookie and Hot Chocolate mornings. Eight people from each year group.


Workshops

We have had some fantastic feedback from our students and Tutors about the workshops and again, are so grateful for the time our presenters gave up to inspire our students.



How do you feel Employability Skills Day has impacted on you?















The Night At The Musicals 2024 - Fundraiser



SORA

Since we launched SORA, our free reading app, over the summer we are delighted to say that **300 books** have been read, which is brilliant!

Please can I request, if you have not downloaded the app on your phone/chromebook already, that you do so following the instructions.

Install the Sora app from the Apple App Store or Google Play Store, or go to **soraapp.com**.

- In Sora, find your school (or enter your school's setup code), then sign in.
- Browse the Explore tab and borrow a book. Your book will open so you can start reading right away
- Close the book and go to your Shelf to see all your books (including assignments).

From there, you can:

- Tap Open Book or Open Audiobook to read or listen to the book.
- Tap Options to renew or return the book, get to your notes and highlights, and more



The Night Bus Hero By Onjali Q. Rauf Genre: Children's Fiction



What is your current role and who do you work for now?

My current job title is, Events Fundraising Assistant & Data Officer and I work for the charity, WheelPower – British Wheelchair Sports Foundation.

Tell us a bit about your job.

I have a full-time role, working 35.5 hours a week (Monday to Friday). My role splits into two key parts, fundraising and data management. I work at Stoke Mandeville Stadium, the birthplace of the Paralympic games and my role carries a pay range of £18,000 to £23,000 depending on experience. I undertake frequent training and CPD (Continuous Personal Development) to maintain my knowledge of current trends and legislation around fundraising and data management.

What did you study at The Chalfonts Community College and which years were you in Chalfont?

I joined The Chalfonts Community College in 2007 at the start of year 9 and I left in 2009 to move on to college after completing my GCSEs.


