



## Suggested Reading List Year 8




### ***The Sleepwalker* by Robert Muchamore**

A troubled boy named Fahim Bin Hassam calls the air crash investigation hotline and attempts to blame his father....




### ***Northern Lights* by Philip Pullman**

Lyra is a 12-year-old girl who has been allowed to run somewhat wild. She awaits the arrival of her uncle and guardian, Lord Asriel at Jordan College, She spies on him and learns of "Dust", a material that makes magical links. As her uncle leaves Jordan, she meets Mrs Coulter, a beautiful and adventurous woman, and agrees when invited to go and live with her. The Master of the College secretly entrusts Lyra with an alethiometer, a "truth teller" which resembles a silver, many-handed pocket-watch that can answer any question asked by a skilled user. Although unable to read or understand its complex symbols, Lyra takes it with her, and gradually begins to master the device.



### ***The Boy Who Lost His Face* by Louis Sachar**

In a 1989 suburban town, a boy named David tries to get in the cool group by helping his friend Scott, and two troublemakers named Roger and Randy (the former being the leader) carry out a prank. Their target was an elderly woman who was called a witch by all the kids in the neighborhood.




### ***Treasure Island* by Robert Louis Stevenson**


### ***Stargirl* by Jerry Spinelli**


### ***Madame Doubtfire* by Anne Fine**


### ***The Secret Garden* by Frances Hodgson Burnett**


### ***Pigeon Summer* by Ann Turnbull**


***The Pearl* by John Steinbeck**

Kino, a young, strong, and poor Mexican-Indian pearl diver, lives in a small town, La Paz, with his domestic partner (to whom he is not married because he cannot afford to pay the priest for a wedding ceremony), Juana, and his baby son, Coyotito. When Coyotito is stung by a scorpion, Kino must find a way to pay the town doctor, an extremely prejudiced white man, to cure Kino's son. When Kino discovers an enormous pearl the size of a seagull's egg when out diving, he is ready to sell it for money to pay the doctor. But other forces work against Kino.




***Billy the Kid* by Michael Morpurgo**

The book is set during World War II. It is about a boy called Billy who grew up with his hobby, football, and wanted to play for the Chelsea football team. Then his mother gave birth to his brother, Joe, who later in the story joined the army at the beginning of the Second World War. Soon afterwards, his parents receive a message that Joe has died. This happened at Dunkirk on the French coast when the Germans advanced, routing the British army.



***The Chocolate War* by Robert Cormier**

At Trinity, The Vigils, a secret, student-run society, maintain a degree of control by giving their peers "assignments" that range from ridiculous to cruel. Though The Vigils is nominally led by the athletic star boxer John Carter, it is the intelligent and manipulative Archie Costello who exerts the most influence over the group.



***The Thief of Always* by Clive Barker**

Harvey Swick is a 10-year-old kid who finds himself bored with school, uninteresting teachers, homework, and his day-to-day life. One day, a man named Rictus flies up to Harvey's window and tells him about a kid's paradise, the Holiday House. At the Holiday House, there are all the sweets a person could ask for, four seasons in a day, Christmas every day, Halloween every night, and everything else you could dream of.
